Te Tihi is an Alliance of nine Iwi, Hapū, and Māori organisations who work collectively to deliver whānau-centred services based on the Te Ara Whānau Ora process.

The approach calls for multiple entities from different sectors to abandon their own agenda in favour of a common agenda, shared measurement and alignment of effort.
